Professor Ameena Majid was born in Dhaka, on August 21, 1950. She was the fourth daughter of Abdul Majid and Sufia Khatun. She was educated from Viqarunnisa Noon School and Holy Cross College and completed her MBBS from Dhaka Medical College in 1976. She was a frolicking beauty and brain, as heard from her class mates. She was born with a golden spoon but her entire life depicted sacrifice and struggle, which was faced with dignity. Her professional excellence knows no bound. She did her FCPS in Obstetrics and Gynaecology in the early 80s and later pursued MMed from University of Dundee, Scotland. She was the pioneer of introducing OSPE in the field of MBBS and FCPS exam.
